

# U.S. Trusts Anti Drug Fight Will Continue

Diplomat points out that it is difficult to explain the success of the fight against drug trafficking with the rising death toll.

Washington.- U.S. Ambassador to Mexico Carlos Pascual dismissed the risk that the current fight against drug trafficking in Mexico lets up during the 2012 presidential election, noting there is a consensus [in Mexico] that the fight must continue.

During a visit to Washington to participate in the meeting of U.S. ambassadors in the hemisphere, Pascual assured Mexican media that he does expect a normal debate about the different components of the antidrug strategy.

"I don't see the risk that some have pointed out about the possibility that perhaps with the 2012 [presidential] elections the fight against drug trafficking will become lax," said the diplomat who presented his credentials in October. Pascual, former vice president of the Brookings Institution before he went to Mexico, highlighted his discussions with representatives of the PAN, PRI and PRD. "I have spoken with representatives of the three main political parties and all have reaffirmed that this fight against drug traffickers must continue," said the U.S. ambassador in the meeting with the Mexican media.

"We will see political debates about tactics and ways to design the [antidrug] strategy and that is fair. Anywhere you go there must be a political debate about the most effective ways to lead public policy," he said referring to what is expected to happen in 2012.

Asked whether he believed that drug trafficking could directly influence the presidential election, Pascual stated that the three parties acknowledge that such threat is present in the municipal level.

"It's the same whether you talk to the PAN, the PRI, or the PRD, I think there is a widespread acknowledgement that what organized crime aims for is to take control at the municipal level to keep their 'black businesses' that will never bring about anything good," he said.

According to Pascual, politicians in Mexico who propose to negotiate with drug traffickers are a minority, but he warned that negotiating would only lead to more infiltration of authorities by criminals.

"Obviously we have heard from time to time people suggesting that the best thing to do is to strike a deal with [drug traffickers] and compromise. But those are exceptions," Pascual pointed out during the meeting that was conducted in Spanish.

In June 2009, the press scooped an audio file where the then candidate and current mayor of San Pedro Garza Garcia Mauricio Fernandez allegedly said he was willing to negotiate with the Beltran Leyva cartel.

"If we compromise we will see more infiltration and that is not a path we can follow," said Pascual about the possibility of negotiating.

The U.S. envoy, born in Cuba in 1961, recognized that in Mexico, one of the paradoxes most difficult to explain is saying the antidrug policy is successful when violence is still raging.

"One of the hardest things is explaining in Mexico how the [antidrug] policy is going forward and being successful when violence is increasing." Pascual admitted, "And it is a superficial contradiction that is hard for everyone to understand."

However, the American diplomat noted that even if the Mexican government stopped targeting drug trafficking organizations, violence would continue because cartels would still fight among them, and therefore there is no other option but to push forward.

With the initiative for the FY2011 budget around the corner, Pascual avoided commenting on the amount the U.S. will offer Mexico for antidrug support in the

For your reading pleasure, below is a collection of odds and ends for the upcoming trip to Mexico for the High Level Consultative Group.

# The Campaign to Save America's Treasures Fact Sheet February 2010

- We are dismayed by the FY2011 budget recommendation to eliminate Save America's Treasures. This decreases the Department of Interior's Historic Preservation Fund (HPF) by 30% and represents the greatest cuts to preservation since the 1980's.
- 2009 marked the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Save America's Treasures. Begun by then-First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton to mark the millennium by addressing the alarming deterioration of the country's most important sites and collections, SAT was continued by First Lady Laura Bush who recognized the ongoing need and responsibility to steward our patrimony. It has grown into the most successful preservation effort in the country's history. In recognition of the vital role it plays, in March 2009, President Obama signed the law permanently authorizing SAT and Preserve America to ensure their long-term viability.
- Contrary to the justification (see below) for eliminating the program, Save America's
  Treasures clearly advances the goals of the National Historic Preservation Act.
  Almost \$294 million in federal challenge grants have been awarded to preserve over
  1,100 nationally significant sites, structures and collections in every state and
  territory. These grants help instill pride in America's heritage across communities
  nationwide, but equally important, they are well-known drivers of economic
  development and employment.
- These budget recommendations are intended to save taxpayer dollars—but SAT funds do not come out of taxpayers' pockets. The HPF is funded out of offshore oil and gas lease revenues specifically targeted to conservation/ preservation programs. In fact, while SAT's funds are being eliminated, the Land and Water Conservation Fund is being increased by the same amount—no money is being saved in this transaction that would devastate this country's focus on preserving our national heritage.
- The impact of the federal Save America's Treasures program is magnified by its private matching requirement. While each grant requires a dollar-for-dollar match and is used as critical leverage to attract non-federal support, many projects produce matching contributions many times OVER the government's investment. SAT funds have leveraged more than \$377 million in private and other non-federal investment. Save America's Treasures at the National Trust for Historic Preservation, as the program's principal private partner, has generated another \$57 million in contributions from state and local governments, individuals, foundations and corporations.
- Save America's Treasures creates jobs. Between 1999 and 2009, Save America's Treasures bricks-and-mortar preservation projects\*\* have created well over 16,000 jobs in cities, small towns and rural communities across the country (calculated with

- the same method used by the Stimulus Program to track jobs). The average total cost per job created by SAT is \$13,780. This compares with the White House announcement that the Stimulus Package is creating one job for every \$248,000.
- \*\* These calculations do not reflect Save America's Treasures collections projects, which we estimate would add several thousands more jobs for conservators and museum professionals.\*\*
- This program gives the government a huge bang for its buck. In addition to monetary returns, SAT projects are both anchors and engines for larger community revitalization initiatives. To qualify, SAT projects must be "shovel-ready" and directly stimulate local revitalization.
- Every project must follow the Secretary of Interior's Standards, be vetted and approved for quality and feasability by the NPS and its federal partner agencies according to the guidelines, and follow the Section 106 review process, grantees are closely monitored and administered by the NPS, and require detailed reporting standards.
- Save America's Treasures efforts have provided a very substantial benefit to our National Parks, including: Gettysburg, Valley Forge, Ellis Island, Mesa Verde, Edison's Invention Factory, White Grass, George Washington's Tents at Yorktown, the Sewall Belmont House, Martin Luther King's Ebenezer Baptist Church, Longfellow's House and Eleanor Roosevelt's Val-Kill Cottage. In fact, over \$19 million in federal SAT funds has been designated for NPS sites, complementing another \$12 million in private grants through SAT at the National Trust. The struggle for adequate resources-- ongoing at virtually every historic site-- is compounded in our national parks that are precluded by law from fundraising.
- While this grant program is the largest pot of money available for preservation in the federal budget, the backlog is still enormous. Through 2009, the federal SAT program received competitive applications from 3,642 projects totaling requests of \$1.45 billion in preservation needs. Last year alone, almost 400 applications were received requesting over \$100 million in critical preservation funds. As grantees and those seeking SAT support will attest, there is no existing entity that could replace this pot of money—especially in the current economy. If lost, it is hard to imagine where comparable support would come from, and the big losers will be our national patrimony and the hundreds of communities in which it's located.
- Stewarding our national heritage is a solemn obligation that passes from one generation to another. Programs like Save America's Treasures are highly relevant to today's world and promote action that boosts our economy and communities nationwide.

# TERMINATION: SAVE AMERICA'S TREASURES AND PRESERVE AMERICA

The Administration proposes to eliminate the Save America's Treasures (SAT) and Preserve America(PA) grant programs so the National Park Service can focus resources on managing national parks and other activities that most closely align with its core mission. The SAT and PA programs have not demonstrated how they contribute to nationwide historic preservation goals.

Justification

SAT and PA are National Park Service matching grant programs that support historic preservation efforts. SAT was started in 1999 as a two-year initiative to commemorate the Millennium by restoring historic buildings and collections. PA was started in 2003 to promote heritage tourism. Although SAT and PA programs use merit-based criteria to evaluate annual nominations for projects, the programs have not demonstrated how they contribute to National historic preservation goals. The programs lack rigorous performance metrics and evaluation efforts, so benefits remain unclear. At least half of SAT funding is provided without using merit-based criteria.

- 4. Activate the law requiring National Electoral Commission (NEC) to place a ceiling on expenditures by parties for election activities
- 5. Stop the political linkage of the election and referenda
- 6. End the smear campaign against opposition parties

- 8. Create a State Council with political parties to iron out all conflict issues



#### Dear TTAB Member:

Congratulations again on being selected as a member of the Travel and Tourism Advisory Board (TTAB). The U.S. Travel Association, whose singular mission is to increase travel to and within the United States, is eager to be a valued resource as you represent the industry's interests. In that spirit, I want to share with you what U.S. Travel considers to be the three immediate opportunities for the TTAB. To assist you in preparing for the meeting on April 8, U.S. Travel is readying a briefing book with more detail on these and other issues affecting our industry. You will receive the briefing materials the first week of April.

Implementing Travel Promotion Act (TPA)

U.S. Travel developed a set of detailed recommendations for those involved in TPA implementation in the areas of strategic priorities, organizational milestones, leadership, funding, success metrics and marketing plans. We have attached them for you in this email. We believe the appointment of a Board of Directors and start-up funding for the Corporation are the two most pressing issues to address with the government at this time. The formation of a Corporation for Travel Promotion and hiring of an Executive Director to oversee its operations cannot move forward without the appointment of a Board of Directors. Therefore, we have urged the Commerce Department to work quickly with the Departments of Homeland Security and State to nominate a Board of Directors and to select individuals who are well respected for their expertise in international marketing by the travel community.

Regarding the funding for TPA, the bill was originally drafted two years ago and was written under the assumption that it would pass before the beginning of Fiscal Year 2010 (Oct 1, 2009). The intent was to have a full year of FY2010 for the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to implement the fee collection system established by TPA to fund the Corporation's first year. Fiscal Year 2010 is critical because the legislation authorizes \$10 million from the fee to be transferred to the Corporation to hire staff, develop marketing plans and conduct other activities that will ensure the longterm success of the program. However, with six months left in FY 2010, it appears that the rule and implementation of the new fee mechanism will need to be expedited. If a fee is not collected in FY 2010, it will prevent the Corporation from receiving the \$10 million in funding to begin its work and jeopardize the core objective of the bill. Accordingly, it is critical that the Departments of Homeland Security and Commerce work together to expedite the fee rule, loan the Corporation the money in FY10 or inform Congress that a technical correction to the bill is needed in order to secure the \$10 million in start-up costs.

Efficient Air Travel Security Screening

Within the TSA screening process, long lines, occasionally poor customer service and inconsistent policies have frustrated many air travelers over the past several years. TSA has made some efforts to improve the screening process through use of self-select lanes based on a traveler's familiarity with the security process. However, additional efforts to more securely and efficiently process travelers through the TSA screening process must be developed.

U.S. Travel is creating a blue ribbon panel of approximately 20 experts from various organizations and industries to propose a comprehensive screening process that maximizes security and minimizes the burden on travelers. This panel is necessary, in part, because key stakeholders such as airlines and airports and the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) do not have the luxury to build a long-term plan in travelers' best interests in the midst of day-to-day crises. The panel includes experts in aviation security, queuing, technology and privacy, and will solicit the views of frequent travelers who will bring their "road warrior" views to the panel.

The group will bring a "blue sky" approach to the challenge of achieving frictionless security by: (a) thinking beyond what the process looks like today, (b) understanding the dual need for security and efficiency, and (c) evaluating the process and proposals from the eyes of the traveler. The panel will make recommendations after convening during the next several months. These recommendations can become a primary focus of the Travel and Tourism Advisory Board.

Visa Access

Following the terrorist attacks of 9/11, needed reforms to safeguard America's travel systems were instituted across U.S. government departments. The U.S. visa application and review process carried out by the Department of State, for instance, underwent significant security changes including a near 100 percent interview requirement for non-immigrant visa applicants. This concerted effort to safeguard the U.S. visa issuance process, however, was not matched with staffing, resources, technology or new programs to ensure the continued timely and efficient processing of visa applications. U.S. Travel recommends dedicating new staff resources to countries targeted as emerging markets such as Brazil, China and India in order to meet the visa processing demands we know exist there. We also believe it is critical that the State Department explore creative technology solutions, such as videoconferencing technology for visa interviews, that will improve access to U.S. Consulates for travelers in geographically large countries.

On behalf of the entire travel industry, thank you for your willingness to take time from your busy schedule to represent our industry's views to our federal leaders. Speaking with one voice will help focus policymakers on the issues that will present the best opportunities to help the travel community address our critical needs during these challenging times.

### Executive Summary: Road Map for Implementation of the Travel Promotion Act

The full Road Map for Implementation of the Travel Promotion Act contains detailed recommendations in the areas of strategic priorities, organizational milestones, leadership, funding, success metrics and marketing plans. An excerpt of those recommendations follows:

Strategic Priorities

Significant opportunities to positively impact the U. S. economy via increased inbound travel exist and should be addressed by the Corporation for Travel Promotion ("Corporation").

- Creating Alignment on Inbound Travel Promotion Opportunities among federal government and industry stakeholders to ensure aligned efforts
- Establishing a Best-in-Class Inbound Travel Promotion Resource to assist travel industry
  organizations in effectively increasing inbound travel
- Creating One Voice to improve the world's perceptions of and desire to visit the U.S.
- Leveraging Collective Resources of the federal government and industry to efficiently and
  effectively increase inbound travel to the U.S.
- Effectively Communicating Corporate Goals and Results to ensure support of government and industry stakeholders
- Developing Programs that Add Value Attract Industry Participation to attract industry cash
  and in-kind investments that will fund the work of the Corporation

Organizational Milestones

Additionally, successful formation will include completion of the following key milestones by the Department of Commerce and the Corporation's board of directors and staff:

#### Department of Commerce:

- Establish the Office for Travel Promotion to liaise with the Corporation
- Appoint the Corporation's Board of Directors within 4 to 6 months of enactment
- Ensure Implementation of the ESTA fee within 9 months of enactment

#### **Board of Directors**

- Form the non-profit corporation in the District of Columbia
- Select President/Executive Director within 8 months of enactment
- Set direction for coordination with other travel industry organizations and boards

#### President and Staff

- Develop cash and in-kind funding strategy and plan and implement by October 1, 2010
- Establish committees to inform plans and obtain industry input
- Establish working relationships with government departments and agencies in order to facilitate improved communication of US entry procedures within 1 year of enactment
- Complete consumer research within 15 months of enactment
- Complete brand and marketing plan development within 18 months and begin to implement

### U.S. TRAVEL ASSOCIATION

Leadership

The Corporation's board members and president need to be equally well regarded by the industry and public sector. We encourage the Corporation to resist political influence and focus its leadership decisions on individuals who are able to help the program earn credibility, secure funding and demonstrate success.

### **Board Member Qualifications**

- Professionally active at the CEO or senior executive level
- Willing to actively participate on critical activities of the Corporation, particularly at formation
- Respected among industry peers, members of Congress and other stakeholders
- Expertise in and ability to represent thorough perspective of the industry sector they represent
- Significant knowledge in the areas of international markets and international inbound travel
- Knowledge of international marketing, including brand development
- Able to represent a broad US geographic perspective

Executive Director/President Qualifications

The Corporation's president should have significant experience working directly in or with the travel industry and must be able to build relationships and alignment, generate financial support, lead the direction of the organization and its staff, work effectively with the federal government, and demonstrate strong fiscal management. A position profile is included in the full Road Map.

It is suggested that the Secretary of Commerce establish a nominating committee made up of travel industry, Department of Commerce and White House staff representatives who can evaluate and advise the Secretary of Commerce as to the strongest candidates for each board seat. Should the Secretary wish to establish a nominating committee, the U.S. Travel Association would be willing to assist in the communication with and recruitment of committee members, as needed and appropriate.

Securing industry financial investment is integral to the long-term viability of the Corporation. The industry will be most likely to make investments in paid participation programs with an expected positive return on investment. The Corporation should consider development of the following types of paid participation programs in order to take full advantage of the favorable 1:2 match in fiscal year 2011.

- Coordinated special advertising sections in print publications
- Co-operative advertising and promotional programs
- Advertising placements in the marketing organization's publications
- Participation in trade shows, missions, FAM tours and events for travel buyers and media
- Coordinated efforts to attract international events to the U. S. (e.g. Olympics, World Cup)

Success Metrics

The Corporation should seek active government and industry involvement in the process to identify key performance indicators and set specific objectives. Consideration should be given to the following potential performance indicators:

- Job and new tax revenue creation
- Increase in international visitation, length of stay and spending from specific target countries
- US share of outbound travel from target countries
- US brand awareness and perceptions among target consumers

Marketing Plans

Building a comprehensive marketing plan is essential to the success of the Corporation. Several principles should be considered when developing the Corporation's marketing plan:

- Seek Expert Advice: Leverage the industry's expertise to inform plans and programs.
- Build on What is Already Being Done: Inventory the industry's international promotion activities and create plans to "fill the gaps" not currently being addressed.
- Fish Where the Fish are Biting: Target high volume countries and travel segments with incremental market share potential in order to generate near-term returns on investment.
- Approach Initial Targets as "Proof of Concept": Develop comprehensive marketing plans
  designed to generate near-term returns and add value to the U. S. economy.

A suggested strategic framework for the Corporation's marketing plans, including recommended marketing strategies is included in the Road Map:

Strategic Marketing Intent: Increase inbound visitation and spending from targeted countries

Marketing Objectives:

- Objective 1: Improve communication of US international travel policies and procedures
  Objective 2: Increase target consumer perceptions of and intent to travel to the US
- Objective 3: Expand the presence and distribution of U. S. travel products and services in target countries and within target segments

In addition to developing a strategic framework, other foundational work must be done to inform the development of marketing plans and programs:

- Identify Target Countries based on total country value, as defined by:
  - O Current and future expected market size
  - o Current US market share of international travel and potential for growth
  - O Visitor value expenditures, length of stay, number and location of destinations visited
  - o Accessibility and/or barriers to inbound visitation
  - o Consumer perceptions
  - Market cost level of competition, media and resource costs
  - o Market tolerance economic stability, crisis response (e.g. H1N1, SARS, etc.)
- Implement a Robust Market Research Program to inform brand and marketing plans
  - o Target customer profiling and segmentation
  - o Inbound travel data and analysis
  - Marketing performance tracking
- Create a Powerful Brand built on deep customer insight and a compelling proposition that
  embodies both a unified essence of the U.S. brand, as well as the unique attributes its varied
  destinations and experiences provide.
- Develop and Implement Marketing Work Plans -- designed to deliver on marketing objectives and strategies

#### Strategic Priorities

The Corporation for Travel Promotion should be guided by the principle of doing for the industry and US economy what individual organizations cannot do alone. With this as its focus, the Corporation should seek to develop inbound travel strategies and programs that fill gaps not currently addressed by the industry, and avoid duplicating or competing with current inbound travel promotion activities. The Corporation should consider the following strategic priorities:

Creating Alignment on Inbound Travel Promotion Opportunities

The existence of the Corporation for Travel Promotion presents an opportunity for significantly greater alignment across the travel industry and federal government with regards to the economic opportunities that increased inbound travel provides. The Corporation will be in a unique position to act as a catalyst for creation of a common point of view on the specific economic opportunities and the strategies and tactics deployed to realize them.

As the Corporation is created and its strategic plan formed, it is essential to establish early alignment with both public and private sector stakeholders, including the organizations who actively promote and/or impact international inbound travel today – state and destination marketing organizations; travel agents, tour operators and other travel distributors; travel suppliers and attractions; and the federal government departments setting the direction for and managing the international inbound travel process.

Holding an inbound travel promotion summit, bringing industry and federal government together in one venue, to introduce the organization, share its strategic plan, and communicate organizational goals will begin to establish a shared understanding of the importance of international inbound travel and the best ways to improve communication of US travel procedures and positively impact growth. Regularly occurring summits that provide updates on these areas, as well as the performance of past and current programs, will serve to maintain that alignment and create confidence in and support for the work of the Corporation.

Establishing a Best-in-Class Inbound Travel Promotion Resource

Expertise in inbound travel promotion exists in many different areas of the private and public sectors today. Unfortunately, the collective expertise is not easily accessed when organizations choose to expand their travel promotion efforts into new countries or promotional channels.

Significant value can be provided by serving as a centralized resource for access to inbound travel promotion knowledge and advice. The Corporation should seek to create a staff with robust international travel promotion experience, and also create a mechanism by which the capabilities of other entities can be engaged to share expertise. This knowledge can be used in three ways:

- 1. To inform the development of programs that enable more effective, integrated marketing
- To connect the industry with each other, as well as federal government resources, to share knowledge about effectively promoting inbound travel in key target countries
- 3. To better enable the private sector to leverage the Corporation for Travel Promotion and attract additional visitors to the U.S.

Creating One Voice to Improve the World's Perceptions of and Desire to Visit the US

Only the Corporation for Travel Promotion will be in a position to develop and deliver a compelling message to international travelers that improves their perceptions of the United States and increases their desire to visit. A US brand that is welcoming to both new and returning international travelers and effectively conveys the multitude of travel experiences the United States offers is needed to overcome negative perceptions about the United States and its entry policies and procedures.

In addition to creating the U.S. brand voice, the Corporation should develop relationships with organizations currently communicating to international travelers and provide the marketing tools to facilitate consistent delivery of those messages in all communications channels. Core to this effort is ensuring that federal government offices and employees overseas are aware of the impact their communications regarding travel policies and procedures can have on consumer perceptions and that tools are provided to enable these offices to support a positive, welcoming US message.

Leveraging Collective Resources to Promote Inbound Travel

Significant communication to international travelers and travel buyers occurs today. Those communications are delivered by both the federal government and travel industry. Prior to establishing new communications to those same travelers, the Corporation should seek to increase the impact of current communications activities. By creating message integration and elevating the impact of existing communications, the Corporation will enable the government and industry to do more with the same resources. Examples of opportunities for integration and elevation include:

- Tapping into the in-country resources and capabilities of the US Commerce and State
  Departments' through the commercial services groups and embassies in targeted countries to
  send a consistent message about travel to the US, including travel policies and procedures
- Providing the tools necessary for industry and government organizations to integrate those messages into their communications, including brand identity standards, training modules, and communications templates
- Integrating consistent US brand messaging throughout international trade shows, on trade missions, and at other international events
- Coordinating with the travel industry and others to enhance the online and offline presence
  of US travel messaging and content in their electronic and print communications



In addition to focusing on the strategic priorities outlined above, the Corporation will need to establish credibility within the industry and secure financial participation by doing the following:

Effectively Communicating Corporate Goals and Results

Knowledge and understanding of the Travel Promotion Act and its intent vary across industry and government stakeholders. In order to silence potential critics and establish confidence in the Corporation, the board and staff of the Corporation for Travel Promotion must place a high priority on the comprehensive and effective communication of its priorities, plans, goals, and results.

In addition to using the travel summits referenced earlier in this document, the Corporation can effectively communicate its plans by speaking at industry and government conferences and events, through reports it issues to Congress and by publishing periodic updates via the publicly accessible website required by the Travel Promotion Act. Additionally, the Corporation should seek to create advocates out of its board members and others who can speak on behalf of the Corporation's plans.

Developing Programs that Add Value Attract Industry Participation

The Corporation should seek to engage the industry in their inbound travel promotion efforts by creating programs that "fill the gaps" in the industry's current marketing activities. Not only is this an important way to support growth in inbound travel, it can become the main vehicle for securing the required industry cash investments stipulated by the Travel Promotion Act. Due to the fact that securing cash investments is essential to the viability of the Corporation, the board and executive director should place significant emphasis on developing program plans and hiring the required staff to secure industry investments as early as possible.

Four operating principles should guide the development and execution of the Corporation's plans. These principles will help to ensure optimal support for its plans and programs:

- Be Inclusive: The Corporation will gain industry support as long as relevant industry verticals have a voice in the work of the Corporation through board representation, participation on committees and dialogue at industry meetings and events
- Invest Resources Wisely: Expectations for results will be high, so it is important for the
  Corporation to closely monitor the investments made in administration versus program
  expenditures. The Corporation should seek to leverage the capabilities and resources of
  other organizations, including government agencies, industry associations, and others.
- Take a Customized Approach: Avoid a one-size-fits-all marketing approach. The
  perception issues and barriers to inbound travel vary from country to country, so it is logical
  to expect that the approaches used to increase inbound travel will vary as well.
- 4. Don't Try to be Everything to Everyone: The Corporation should avoid implementing programs at the request of its stakeholders if those programs cause the organization to lose focus on its goals or fail to generate a positive impact on inbound travel and the US economy.



#### Organizational Milestones

Getting the Corporation for Travel Promotion off to a strong start will help to ensure that industry and government support for the Travel Promotion Act continues. By focusing on the right strategic priorities and organizational milestones the Corporation can demonstrate its ability to positively impact inbound travel's contributions to the United States economy. The following includes suggested milestones and strategic priorities for the first five year legislative period.

Year 1: Creating the Foundation

Creating a solid organizational foundation should be the primary focus during the first year following passage of the Travel Promotion Act. During this critical first year, several milestones will need to be achieved:

- Ensuring implementation of the ESTA fee within 9 months of enactment of the Travel Promotion Act in order to generate the first \$10M in funding for FY 2010
- Establishing the Office of Travel Promotion within the Department of Commerce
- Creating nominating committee to assist in identification of potential board members
- Appointing the Corporation's board of directors within 4 to 6 months after enactment
- Forming the Corporation under the District of Columbia Non-Profit Corporation Act
- Hiring a high-caliber leader as the Corporation's President
- Developing a senior staff plan and beginning selection and hiring of key positions
- Establishing coordination and alignment with US Travel, TTAB and other organizations
- Facilitating ongoing board involvement and establishing advisory committees
- Developing a cash and in-kind funding strategy and plan for implementation in FY 2011
- Initiating consumer research to inform brand development

Year 2: Turning Plans into Action

Once the organization is established, the federal government and industry will be looking to the organization to quickly turn plans into action. In order to establish credibility and support, the Corporation should focus in year 2 on creating a solid strategic plan based on data, insights and industry input and initiating implementation of its marketing plan. Key milestones include:

- Establishing working relationships with government agencies to support an aligned travel message and effective communication of U.S. entry procedures
- Implementing programs that will generate industry cash and in-kind investments
- Developing a data plan and using research and analysis to inform brand and marketing plan development
- Completing development of a powerful consumer brand
- Establishing methods to measure the performance of marketing programs
- Securing industry input and feedback into business and marketing plans
- Launching select components of the marketing plan
- Continuing to hire departmental staff, as needed

Years 3-5: Building on Success

Securing support for the Corporation beyond the initial legislative period will require demonstration of meaningful impact on inbound travel activity. As indicated in Year 2 milestones, the Corporation should focus on implementing performance measurement systems to enable the objective evaluation of the return on its investment of individual marketing programs and the collective marketing effort. Generating and communicating positive returns on investment will assist the Corporation in its ongoing efforts to generate cash and in-kind investment and support for reauthorization of the program beyond the initial 5-year legislative period.

In addition to measuring and communicating the results of programs launched in Year 2, the Corporation should plan to continue to implement its marketing plan, expanding into new markets and/or additional marketing channels, based upon available funding. Strategic recommendations with regards to marketing plans, including selection of target, objectives, and strategies are provided in a subsequent section of this document.



### Organizational Leadership

Securing high-caliber talent to support the Corporation in the form of board membership, executive leadership, and senior staff is the single biggest way to garner early government and industry support for the organization. Industry leaders will expect to see board appointments and staff hiring of experienced, respected individuals with a significant track record of positively impacting the travel industry. These senior leaders need to be equally well regarded by the public sector, however, we encourage the Corporation to resist political influence and focus its leadership decisions on individuals most likely to enable the program to earn credibility, raise financial support and demonstrate success. Principles to consider when forming the Corporation's leadership structure include:

- Credibility: Appoint and hire high-caliber industry leaders to board seats and the
  position of president. All must possess the ability to garner support from both industry
  peers and the public sector.
- Equal Voice. Give all board members an equal voice to ensure the perspective of the total industry is well represented.
- Aligned Missions: Ensure CTP board and the Travel and Tourism Advisory Board are
  mutually supportive in working towards increasing industry and US economic benefit.
- Expert Advice. Establish and leverage committees made up of industry experts to inform CTP marketing and program plans and garner industry support.
- Leverage: Consider ways to leverage the expertise and capabilities of other
  organizations and communities (e.g. Visit USA committees) to assist in forming and
  executing the Corporation's plans rather than creating overlapping capabilities within the
  Corporation.

While it is widely understood that filling the eleven board seats and conducting a search and selection process for the Corporation's president will take some time, focus should be placed on completing these critical steps in an efficient and effective manner. To aide in this process, board member qualifications and a profile for the position of President have been developed.

### Board Membership Qualifications

It is acknowledge that the Board of Directors must represent the breadth of the travel and tourism industry and the specific identification of board seats across many industry verticals is one way that will be achieved. While it is imperative to have a diverse group of senior executives advising the organization, it is important that they share some common qualifications with regard to leadership experience. We recommend that executives with the following qualifications be considered for board appointment:

- Professionally active at the CEO or senior executive level and willing to actively participate
  with other board members on critical activities of the Corporation, particularly at formation
- Respected among industry peers, members of Congress and other stakeholders
- Have appropriate expertise and experience in and able to represent a thorough perspective
  of the industry sector they represent
- · Significant knowledge in the areas of international markets and international inbound travel
- Knowledge of international promotion and marketing, including brand development
- Able to represent a broad US geographic perspective when providing advice on matters pertaining to the Corporation's strategic plans

It is also acknowledged that board candidates must meet the following criteria:

- Must be a US citizen
- May not be a federally-registered lobbyist
- Collective board membership must be balanced in gender, racial and ethnic diversity, urban and rural geographies and geographic regions

**Board of Directors Nominating Committee** 

To aide in timely appointment of the eleven board members of the Corporation, it is suggested that the Department of Commerce consider establishing a nominating committee made up of travel industry, Department of Commerce and White House staff representatives who can evaluate and advise the Secretary of Commerce as to the strongest candidates for each board seat.

The nominating committee should be established as soon as possible, even before passage of the Travel Promotion Act and should be comprised of individuals who can represent and engage with the industry sectors to be represented on the board. Nominating committee members should be assigned to represent a specific board seat(s) and tasked with proactive outreach to members of that industry sector to solicit names for nomination. Nominations should then be evaluated against the board member qualification criteria by the committee representative and those meeting the criteria should be proposed for consideration by the nominating committee and Secretary of Commerce.

Should the Secretary of Commerce wish to establish a nominating committee, the U. S. Travel Association would be willing to assist in the communication with and recruitment of committee members, as needed and appropriate.



### Executive Director/President Qualifications

As previously referenced, placing a well-regarded, high caliber executive in the position of President is critical to garnering early support for the work of the Corporation. The leader of the Corporation should have significant experience working directly in or with the travel industry, ideally focused on international inbound travel. If it is not possible to find a candidate with such experience, the other requirements provided in the following position profile must be met.

Specifically, the President of the Corporation must be able to build relationships, establish alignment, generate financial support, lead the direction of the organization and its staff, understand how to effectively work with the federal government, and demonstrate strong fiscal management. It is recommended that the position profile contain the following:

### Primary Responsibilities:

Business Leadership and Development

 Develop and communicate the Corporation's mission, objectives, and successes with private and public sector stakeholders to ensure alignment and active support

 Provide leadership in the development of the Corporation's operating, human resource, and legal policies and procedures. Oversee management of the Corporation's administrative functions, ensuring fiscal responsibility and compliance with approved practices.

Actively engage the travel industry in the development of marketing programs that will assist
in securing cash and in-kind contributions and ESTA matching funds

Oversee the development, management and reporting of all corporate activities, including
the budget and accompanying financial statements, in accordance with Board of Director
and federal requirements. Ensure all reporting requirements are met.

 Manage and direct the Corporation's staff, including search and selection of senior staff, development of staffing plans, personnel policies, and staff goals and expectations

 Lead Board of Directors meetings, including agenda development and reporting out of meeting activities and decisions

Travel Marketing

 Direct the development and ongoing management of all aspects of the US international travel brand, including positioning and brand identity (logo, messaging, imagery)

 Direct consumer-focused market research to understand trends affecting international travel to the United States, inform development and management the brand and marketing plan and evaluate performance of the Corporation's marketing programs

Oversee the development, management and evaluation of the marketing plans and programs

Promote creation of strategic partnerships in support of the Corporation's programs

 Ensure effective communication of US travel policies and procedures to international travelers as part of the Corporation's marketing programs

 Coordinate international travel messaging and other marketing communications (online messaging, trade show presence, etc.) with industry organizations and federal government agencies/departments, including overseas government offices



### Public Relations, Media Relations, Industry Relations and Communications

- Represent the United States and the Corporation at events where inbound travel and tourism
  is discussed or where a representative is required
- Proactively communicate with the industry, federal government and other stakeholders on matters related to inbound travel and tourism and the Corporation's plans
- Act as the Corporation's senior media contact for inbound travel and tourism issues
- Act as the Corporation's lead spokesperson at international travel and tourism conferences
  that occur within and outside of the United States and in which the Corporation has a
  principal administrative, operational or sponsorship role
- Oversee the development of all official communications, including reports, bulletins, news releases and brochures, with regard to the Corporation's plans, programs, and achievements
- Liaise with industry CEOs to ensure active support for CTP plans and programs

#### Experience Required:

The successful candidate should have a proven track record, including success in an executive leadership position. The candidate should also possess all or many of the following:

- Travel industry knowledge and experience to establish individual as a proven leader in the
  eyes of the travel and tourism industry and federal government
- Prior experience in or extensive knowledge of international markets
- Knowledge of effective approaches to working with the federal government
- · Proven record of hiring, retaining and managing a high-performing team
- Experience in effectively building a business or business unit from start up
- Proven success in securing financial support/investment from a variety of stakeholders
- Previous brand marketing experience, including market research, brand identity development, advertising, public relations, events, and promotions
- Experience and track record in marketing, specifically in developing and successfully implementing marketing plans, including definition of objectives, strategies, goals, and tactics
- Extensive experience and prior success in working with a Board of Directors and a diverse set of stakeholders in the public and private sectors
- Strong business acumen, particularly in the areas of strategic planning and financial management with an eye towards expense management and return on marketing investments

#### Personal Attributes:

The candidate should also possess all or many of the following:

- Effective team builder and people manager
- · Strong results orientation and ability to create organizational accountability
- · Strategic thinker with ability to translate strategy into action
- Positive public presence and level of comfort being the public face of the Corporation
- Entrepreneurial spirit with proven ability to effectively launch a new organization
- Diplomacy and ability to create alignment across a diverse set of stakeholders
- High ethical standards and integrity
- Strong, but flexible decision maker able to respond to changing environments
- Collaborative team player who proactively seeks and utilizes stakeholder input
- · Willingness to travel extensively
- In compliance with federal employment requirements, candidate must be a US citizen



#### Program Funding

In addition to ensuring timely implementation of the ESTA fee in order to generate the first \$10 million in seed funding for the Corporation along with an ongoing pool for matching funds, the Corporation's long-term viability is dependent upon its ability to secure financial participation by the industry. The charts below indicate the cash and in-kind investments needed to achieve a variety of program funding levels. The first chart indicates investment requirements during the 2011 fiscal year where each \$1 invested by the industry is matched with \$2 from the ESTA fund. The second chart indicates the investments required to achieve the same program funding levels during fiscal years 2012-2014 where contributions are matched \$1 for \$1.

Generating Cash Investments through Paid Participation Programs

Efforts to generate cash funding will be most successful if the Corporation creates programs that add value to the industry's existing marketing programs. The Corporation will likely meet significant challenges if it approaches this endeavor solely as a fundraising campaign. The industry will be more likely to make smart marketing investments in paid participation programs with an expected positive return on investment. With that in mind, the Corporation should make development of paid participation programs a top priority in Year 1 in order to take full advantage of the favorable 1:2 match in fiscal year 2011.

When determining the types of paid participation programs that the Corporation should develop, it is important to consider:

- Who might participate in these programs state and destination organizations, suppliers, travel distribution companies, tour operators, or others?
- What might participants be looking to gain from these programs -- access to travel buyers, access to consumers, brand or product awareness, distribution of product messages and offers, all of the above?

Many national marketing organizations of other countries, as well as state and destination marketing organizations in the United States, have successfully implemented paid participation programs as a means to generate cash funding from industry organizations and non-travel industry partners. Paid participation programs generally include:

- Coordinated special advertising sections in print publications
- Promotional partnerships
- Co-operative advertising and promotional programs where expenses are shared
- · Advertising placements in the marketing organization's publications
- · Participation in trade shows and missions and press events
- FAM tours for media and travel buyers
- Coordinated efforts to attract international events to the US (e.g. Olympics, World Cup)

While these programs will provide a means for the Corporation to generate cash funding, it is important to consider that with each come staffing requirements and expense. The Corporation should prioritize those programs which have the highest potential to generate cash investments.

Coordinating In-Kind Investments

Generating in-kind contributions can be achieved through the development of new marketing programs, by placing US brand messaging in existing industry communications, and through recognition of expenses incurred by the industry for purposes of inbound travel promotion. Borrowing from the practices of many international and US state and destination marketing organizations, some potential sources of in-kind contributions include:

- Contributions of product or services: Organizations can provide travel products (e.g. vacation packages, hotel nights, attraction tickets) to be used as part of promotional programs or media trades. As indicated in the Travel Promotion Act, the Corporation can recognize the fair market value of the travel products as in-kind contributions.
- Inclusion in travel industry marketing programs and communications:
   Organizations can integrate US brand messaging in their marketing programs and
   communications, including websites, brochures, press releases, and advertising. The
   Corporation can recognize an appropriate portion of the cost of those programs and
   communications as in-kind contributions.
- Free or discounted advertising: Organizations can offer free or discounted
  advertising opportunities to the Corporation for placement of US brand advertising.
  This approach could apply to partnerships with media outlets in target countries (e.g. a
  media partnership with a major search engine), as long as the media value received by the
  Corporation exceeds the value provided to the partner by the Corporation.

Considering an Assessment

While the Travel Promotion Act gives the Corporation the ability to request industry consideration of an assessment as a means to guarantee cash funding, it is recommended that the Corporation first focus on generating funding through the means outlined above prior to initiating dialogue regarding an assessment. Without having first demonstrated positive returns from its marketing programs, the Corporation will have difficulty securing industry support for such an assessment.

Additionally, there will be several significant questions to address prior to implementing an assessment, including defining which industry organizations should be assessed and determining how to identify revenues derived from international travelers. The time and resources required to address these issues and secure industry support should not be underestimated and would likely be more effectively spent developing programs that will add value to the industry and generate cash and in-kind investments.

### U.S. TRAVEL . ASSOCIATION

#### Success Metrics

Creating alignment on the Corporation's key performance indicators should be a top priority. As the passage of the Travel Promotion Act and formation of the Corporation for Travel Promotion have been greatly anticipated, the industry and public sector will be eager to see the impact of both.

The Corporation should seek active government and industry involvement in the process to identify key performance indicators and set specific objectives. While the desired outcome of the Corporation's efforts will be increased inbound travel, resulting in creation of new travel jobs and tax revenues, consideration should also be given to the following performance indicators:

US brand awareness and perceptions among target consumers

International visitation, length of stay and spending from specific target countries and targeted travel segments (e.g. leisure, MICE)

US share of outbound travel from target countries

In addition to the key performance indicators, the Corporation should identify the measures of success and goals for individual marketing programs, including:

Impressions generated

Ad equivalency generated

Media and promotional response: click through rates, website visits, requests for information, promotional registrations, etc.

While impact on the key performance indicators suggested above will be the best method to measure the impact of the Corporation's marketing efforts, it is important to measure success during the organization's formation and planning phase. Prior to the marketing launch, the Corporation should evaluate its success based on the achievement of key organizational milestones, as well as the level of alignment it creates with its public and private sector stakeholder groups. Alignment can be measured by:

- Post-meeting surveys of the Corporation's stakeholders
- Participation rates in marketing programs
- Levels of industry cash and in-kind investments

#### Marketing Plans

Building a comprehensive marketing plan based on data and insight is essential to the success of the Corporation. To assist in the development marketing plans, a recommended strategic framework and process follows.

Several principles should be considered when developing the Corporation's marketing plan:

- Seek Expert Advice: Leverage the industry's collective customer, country, and
  marketing channel expertise to inform the development of the US brand, research
  initiatives, marketing plans and programs.
- Build on What is Already Being Done: Complete a thorough inventory of current
  international promotion activities across the entire industry, and then create plans based
  on that knowledge. Seek to enhance and/or leverage current activities and "fill the gaps"
  not currently being addressed by the industry.
- Fish Where the Fish are Biting: Target high volume countries and travel segments with incremental market share potential in order to generate near-term returns on investment.
- Approach Initial Targets as "Proof of Concept": Develop comprehensive marketing
  plans designed to generate near-term returns and demonstrate the value the Corporation
  can add to the U.S. economy.

Creating and Activating the Marketing Plan;

A well-crafted marketing plan should act as a guide in identifying the most critical marketing activities that the Corporation will undertake. Recommendations for each step in the marketing plan development process are included below.

### U.S. TRAVEL ASSOCIATION

Step 1: Build a Strategic Framework

Definition of the strategic marketing intent, objectives, and strategies will provide a focused filter through which marketing programs can be prioritized. Identifying specific targets and/or goals based on the success metrics previously mentioned in this document is a critical step in building a strategic framework. The following is a suggested strategic marketing framework:

Strategic Marketing Intent: Increase international inbound visitation to and spending in the United States from targeted countries

Marketing Objectives:

Objective 1: Improve communication of US international travel policies and procedures Objective 2: Increase target consumer perceptions of and intent to travel to the US

Objective 3: Expand the presence and distribution of U. S. travel products and services in target countries and within target segments

Marketing Strategies:

### Objective I: Improve Communication of Travel Policies and Procedures

Develop working relationships with government agencies, including State Department, Commerce, and Homeland Security to align on a positive, welcoming travel message and better communicate US entry requirements

Leverage the Corporation's communications targeting travel buyers and consumers as vehicles to deliver travel policies, procedures, and other relevant information

## Objective 2: Increase Consumer Perceptions and Intent to Travel

Develop and implement a consumer research plan to monitor traveler perceptions of the United States and identify drivers of those perceptions and potential means to improve

Create a powerful US brand identity based on consumer insights that conveys the compelling US travel proposition in a way that engages and resonates with international travelers in each target country

Implement targeted, high impact marketing programs designed to turn increased perceptions into increased visitation and spending

## Objective 3: Expand Presence and Distribution of US Travel Products and Services

Establish marketing programs with travel distributors, wholesalers, tour operators and other large volume travel buyers that increase US travel product presence in their international distribution channels (e.g. co-branded programs and promotions, exchange of in-kind value)

Coordinate opportunities to connect the US travel industry with international travel

### Step 2: Identify Target Countries and Travel Segments

Prioritizing target countries based on reliable data and insights is a critical step in building an effective plan. Key to this step is to understand the total value of each country as defined by:

- Current and future expected market size, particularly size of leisure travel and MICE (Meetings, Incentives, Conventions, Events) segments
- Current US market share of international travel and potential for growth
- Visitor value expenditures, length of stay, number and location of destinations visited
- Accessibility and/or barriers to inbound visitation visa accessibility and process, travel
  costs, airlift situation (routes, frequency and seat capacity)
- Consumer perceptions
- Market cost level of competition, media and resource costs
- Market tolerance economic stability, crisis response (e.g. H1N1, SARS, etc.)

Currently available data for the top 20 visitation producing countries is contained in Appendix 2. While it is suggested that further analysis and industry input be gathered prior to finalizing target country selections, the Corporation should consider the following country segmentation strategy:

With a strategic focus on generating near-term returns on investment, it is suggested that the Corporation focus its marketing activities primarily against established and growth markets where potential exists to generate immediate lifts in visitation and spending. Selective, strategic investments should be made in emerging markets until a time when a market has no/minimal US visitation barriers and it is generating significant outbound leisure and MICE travel. Emphasis should be placed on striking an appropriate balance between near-term ROI and development of new markets.

Additionally, the Corporation should focus its marketing and communications efforts on impacting the leisure and MICE travel segments, which are more easily influenced by marketing and promotional campaigns than the business transient travel segment. Market research, which is addressed in the next step of the marketing plan development process, should be used to further segment the leisure and MICE markets in order to identify actionable consumer and B2B targets.

As previously stated, a focus on generating near-term returns on investment is particularly important for paid participation programs, where industry participants will expect positive returns in exchange for their cash investments.

### Step 3: Develop and Implement a Research and Analysis Plan

Once target countries have been identified, it is critical to understand both the consumers and travel buyers in those markets. Marketing research can be used to identify actionable consumer and B2B target segments against which the Corporation can establish its goals and programs.

Also critical to effective marketing planning and implementation is a foundation of comprehensive, reliable travel and marketing program data used to prioritize marketing opportunities and assess program performance.

### Consumer and Travel Buyer Research

Prior to implementing market research programs, it is important to define the organization's knowledge objectives. It is recommended that the Corporation seek to learn the following about international leisure travelers in target countries in order to inform brand development and create actionable consumer target segments and profiles:

Consumer Perceptions

Current perceptions of the US and travel to the US Sources or drivers of those perceptions (e.g. media impact on perceptions)
Potential means by which to shift those perceptions
Real and perceived barriers to travel to the US (accessibility issues)

### Travel Planning and Buying Process and Behaviors

Frequency and types of trips
Purpose of travel
Travel spending
Criteria for destination selection
Planning lead time
Sources of travel planning information
Methods used to book travel

### Demographic and Psychographic Characteristics

Gender, Age, Income
Make up of travel party
Top travel activities and interest in specialty travel
Psychographic characteristics to inform lifestyle/travel style segmentation

By creating an in-depth picture of the target customer, the Corporation should be well informed to develop a powerful US brand and marketing plan. This data will also serve as a baseline against which future marketing efforts can be evaluated.



### U.S. TRAVEL ASSOCIATION

In addition to developing an in-depth understanding of individual travelers, the Corporation should consider use of qualitative research methods to develop an understanding of the universe of travel buyers in target countries. Specifically, the Corporation should seek to understand:

- Number, size and types of buyers
- Volume of leisure and MICE travel booked through buyers
- Current US product presence with buyers
- Drivers of increased product presence and sales
- Opportunities for joint marketing programs and promotions to increase leisure and MICE travel booked into the US

Travel and Marketing Data and Analysis

Knowing the customers and buyers in each target country is integral to developing effective marketing plans, but these insights should be supplemented with a solid base of travel data, including the indicators identified previously in Step 2.

Inbound Travel Data and Analysis

Currently, the Office of Travel and Tourism Industries (OTTI), under the Department of Commerce, is responsible for collecting and publishing inbound travel statistics, including visitation and receipts as part of the Survey of International Air Travelers. This data is the only current source of original data produced by the federal government on inbound travel and, while this data is informative, sample sizes are generally not adequate to provide analyses for many US destinations: Many in the industry are interested in improving the estimates of inbound overseas visitors, visitor nights and expenditures by state or majordestination visited on a quarterly basis for many of the top origination countries.

The Corporation should work with the Commerce Department, other federal departments and others in the travel industry to enhance existing research and create greater reliability and actionability of the data. Additionally, the Corporation should work with these entities to identify additional approaches to creating actionable travel statistics, including:

- Integrating data collection into the ESTA fee collection process
- Integrating data collection into the forthcoming US VISIT Air Exit Program
- Enhancing data collected as part of I-94 forms
- Working with credit card companies (e.g. American Express and VISA) to utilize credit card spending data

Marketing Data and Analysis

In addition to data collection, the Corporation's plans should consider ongoing data analysis and reporting needs. This includes reporting of inbound visitation and spending trends and forecasts, as well as analysis and reporting of marketing program performance, including response rates and travel bookings.

Subsequent to the launch of communications campaigns, the Corporation should also plan for implementation of ROI studies to measure consumer awareness and message delivery, as well as influence on expected travel behaviors.

### Step 4: Create a Powerful Brand

To engage today's busy consumer, a brand needs to stand out in a sea of marketing clutter. A strong brand should be built on deep customer insight and a compelling value proposition. In order to build the US brand, the Corporation should plan on:

- Completing consumer research as outlined in Step 3
- Engaging a brand identity firm to develop brand concepts and an identity system that is resonant in each target country
- Securing industry participation in the brand development process
- Creating a brand "toolkit" to enable industry-wide activation of the brand, including identity guidelines and standards, communications templates and activation examples

It is important to consider that international consumers see the US as a brand, but that brand is made up of many unique destinations and experiences. The brand that is development must embody both the unified essence of the US brand, as well as the unique attributes its varied destinations and experiences provide.

### Step 5: Develop and Implement Marketing Work Plans

Work plans designed to deliver on marketing objectives and strategies will be driven primarily by the amount of available funding. In order to maximize marketing effectiveness, it is recommended that the Corporation focus on:

- customizing plans for each prioritized country based on consumer insights
- executing comprehensive plans in select markets when budgets are small and expanding into new markets as budgets grow
- launching plans via public relations, online marketing, and industry in-kind efforts and expanding into brand advertising as budgets permit

### Investing the First \$10M - Fiscal Year 2011

The initial \$10 million in funding should be directed to support:

- staff salaries & benefits
- research, data collection and analysis
- brand identity and toolkit development
- initial marketing launch in selected target countries
- establishing an online presence
- launch of select paid participation programs to initiate generation of cash investments required to obtain additional ESTA funding
- other overhead and infrastructure expenses

#### Establishing an Online Presence

Central to the Corporation's marketing efforts should be a strong, engaging online presence. Once the US brand is established, an opportunity exists to leverage the existing Official Travel and Tourism Website of the United States, DiscoverAmerica.com, which launched in June 2008. The site, specifically targeting international travelers from Canada, Mexico, the UK, Germany and Japan and receiving visits from consumers in more than 200 countries, was developed through a cooperative agreement with the Department of Commerce. A \$3.9M cooperative budget, along with an additional \$1.6M in industry match of products and services were used to develop, launch, and manage the site.

The site features fully translated content, including regional, state, and destination information for 117 destinations, travel agent and offer listings, events, official visitor information, and an interactive map. Additionally, the Canada, UK and Japan-targeted versions of the site host a community engine where visitors can post their travel experiences and photos. The site is currently supported with a search engine optimization program to ensure prominent natural search listings. These placements are supplemented with periodic paid placement and display advertising campaigns, as well as participation in social networks, including Facebook and Yahool Answers.

To leverage the existing equity and investments in DiscoverAmerica.com, it is recommended that the Corporation work with the US Travel Association to align branding, messaging and the overall website strategy, including additional investment in key online marketing activities and programs designed to increase site visitation.

Planning for Fiscal Years 2012 through 2014

As program funding grows in fiscal years 2012 through 2014, the Corporation should consider a wide range of communications and marketing programs to support increases in international visitation and spending:

- public relations communications campaigns, issues management and events
- online marketing website, search engine marketing and online advertising
- social media and content online forums and social networking sites and applications
- sponsorships and co-branded promotions joint marketing programs with established brands in target countries
- •. brand advertising integrated online, print and broadcast media

#### Closing Remarks

It is our hope that this road map proves useful during the formation of the Corporation and its plans. The recommendations were developed with the goal to ensure the successful launch of the organization, and we look forward to working with you to enhance the economic value the travel industry provides to the US economy.







### Partners for a New Beginning

The U.S. government has an extraordinary opportunity to capture the outpouring of interest from the private sector to fulfill the vision expressed by the President and Secretary for a "New Beginning" with Muslim communities around the world. To deliver on the President and Secretary's vision and to fulfill the Secretary's mandate to more effectively utilize public-private partnerships to achieve foreign policy objectives, the U.S. government should seize this opportunity to cooperate with the private sector to harness the full range of resources and capabilities available.

To that end, the Department of State, led by S/P and S/GPI, working in concert with S/SRMC and the full array of Bureaus and Offices that have responsibilities associated with the goals of the initiative, will partner with Partners for a New Beginning (PNB), a group of eminent Americans, that is being formed by Madeleine Albright and Walter Isaacson. PNB will be an independent informal group and the Department of State will not direct or control it. Notionally, PNB will be composed of 12 to 15 renowned individuals who are leaders from different types of organizations in the U.S. private sector: industry, finance, education, NGOs, foundations/philanthropy, and entertainment.

PNB members will be volunteers; however, it will be important for them to commit sufficient time to the effort to enhance the likelihood of success. The chair and vice-chair[s] will ask PNB members to serve for two years, with individual members dedicating a significant portion of their time. The United States will find appropriate ways to acknowledge them and thank them for their partnership.

PNB members will be expected to meet in person, correspond via e-mail, and speak via teleconference and telephone with potential private sector partners. The Department of State will brief them in detail on New Beginning initiatives and objectives. They will explore and forge partnership opportunities with a wide range of private sector partners, civil society leaders, and prominent diaspora community members. PNB will have the opportunity to coordinate with one liaison in S/P, who will provide strategic input (to be done in coordination with S/SRMC and S/GPI), and one liaison in S/GPI, who will help to coordinate with the rest of the Department.

# The Expected Role of Partners for a New Beginning

Each member of Partners for a New Beginning will reach out to leaders and decision-makers in his or her field to encourage their participation in New Beginning programs and efforts. Examples of their expected functions include:

1) Bring together and mobilize the private sector to provide support that would complement New Beginning programs and related efforts, especially in key New Beginning areas of focus: economic opportunity, science and technology and education.

2) Map and harness resources and capabilities from the private and civic

sectors.

3) Catalyze opportunities for the United States to collaborate with these actors to achieve shared goals.

Partnership and Funding Arrangements

Working with PNB will enable the United States to go beyond ad hoc engagements with the private sector and pursue a more methodical, systematic, and holistic approach to partnerships. Rather than take the "tin-cup" approach and solicit donations, PNB members will be able to present the menu of U.S. government programs and efforts to potential private sector partners, working with them to select a partnership opportunity and framework that both advances the U.S.'s goals and suits the particular interests of the private sector partners. There will be two primary channels through which PNB could direct private sector support:

- 1. Private sector partners can choose to commit financial resources or in-kind resources in support of USG initiatives. PNB members will be able to channel resources and capabilities to implementers who can oversee programs and efforts that complement U.S. government programs, providing contributions alongside - and advancing and scaling - U.S. government efforts. This means that the U.S. will not have to create any sort of administrative mechanism to accept donations directly, minimizing red tape and demands on administrative capacity.
- 2. Private sector partners may choose to pursue partnerships through developing related, but independent, efforts, which would support and advance the New Beginning goals through related programs. We can facilitate connections to, and collaboration with, United States government

programs to support these independent efforts through mechanisms that will not include U.S. funding. These related but independent programs will provide a means to create innovative private sector solutions without resorting to USG funding.

Harnessing additional resources through parallel contributions and related, but independent, efforts will not require the U.S. government to establish any administrative structure or formal funding mechanism in order to collaborate with Partners for a New Beginning.

# Requirements from the United States government

Partners for a New Beginning members will join PNB on an independent basis and will not be compensated for their efforts. The coalition will be self-formed, self-supporting, and self-administered, but the United States will initiate a partnership with PNB to support and facilitate its work:

- We would seek to arrange up to three meetings with the Secretary: one kick-off meeting; one meeting following the first year to report on the group's progress, and one meeting after the second year to report on the group's achievements.
- We will seek to organize a formal announcement of the partnership between PNB and the Department of State at the Department with the Secretary, the chair and vice-chair, and other senior Department of State officials in attendance.
- R is prepared to provide public affairs and public diplomacy support to profile PNB's efforts, from pre-announcement planning to amplification of the announcement event and subsequent activities.
- S/P, working in coordination with S/SRMC and S/GPI, will provide strategic input and guidance as necessary to PNB.
- S/GPI will provide partnership guidance and will facilitate coordination between coalition members and interlocutors at State. PNB members will be asked to provide details of potential private sector partners to S/GPI before entering into discussions to pursue a partnership. By working with relevant regional and functional bureaus, S/GPI will coordinate the necessary vetting to ensure that the potential partner would be a suitable partner and there is no conflict of interest with relevant Department programs and operations.
- We will identify designates in each regional and functional bureau that would like to be involved, enabling S/GPI to plug into every part of the Department and to facilitate coordination between the Bureaus and PNB.

- L will work closely with all involved parties throughout the formation of PNB to ensure that all interactions between PNB and the Department of State are legal and appropriate.
- There may be cases where program managers and implementers in the
  Bureaus do not think that a contribution from a proposed partner is in the
  U.S. national interest. In those cases, program managers and implementers
  would advise PNB that there would not be any official support or
  partnership, and PNB members would be encouraged to consider other
  alternatives.

#### Conclusion

PNB can become a vital tool and capability for advancing the vision of the President and Secretary. It will be a force multiplier. PNB members will not be envoys. They will not have policy authority. They will bring together the private sector in ways that will be supportive of our foreign policy objectives. We do not envision PNB members interacting under the program with foreign governments, but with NGO and other private sector partners both in the United States and abroad. By working with Partners for a New Beginning, the U.S. government can exemplify how partnerships can empower and support the Secretary's priorities by harnessing private sector resources and capabilities. PNB will also foster new networks among the Department of State's regional and functional bureaus, S/P, S/GPI, and S/SRMC, thus fulfilling the Secretary's mandate for new efforts to advance our foreign policy objectives through partnerships.

This will be an innovative public-private partnership that could bring in a wealth of resources and capabilities to an important Presidential and Secretarial priority. It would send a powerful message to Muslim communities around the world that some of the most eminent and respected individuals in the United States are committed to advancing the New Beginning – and hopefully inspire other private citizens to engage and support the collective effort.

Background

The U.S. government has an extraordinary opportunity to capture the outpouring of interest from the private sector to fulfill the vision expressed by the President and you for a "New Beginning" with Muslim communities around the world. To that end, we propose that you agree to form a partnership between the Department of State and Partners for a New Beginning (PNB). PNB will be an independent informal group of 12 to 15 highly eminent Americans from a variety of fields: industry, finance, education, NGOs, foundations/philanthropy, and entertainment. PNB members will reach out to private sector entities to develop partnerships advancing the programs and goals of the "New Beginning."

Madeleine Albright has expressed willingness to serve as chair, Walter Isaacson has expressed willingness to serve as a vice-chair, and Albright has expressed willingness to reach out to Muhtar Kent (CEO of Coca-Cola) to serve as a second vice-chair. Albright and Isaacson have agreed on a Memorandum of

Understanding outlining the terms of this partnership. Walter Isaacson has agreed to have the Aspen Institute provide administrative support to PNB. Aspen has asked for a small sum (\$100,000 to \$150,000) from the Department of State to help pay for that administrative support. Deputy Secretary Lew's office, working with F, has identified funding that the Department will be able to provide through a grant to Aspen, enabling us to proceed towards a launch.

PNB will act as a force multiplier for our efforts by harnessing private sector resources, expertise, and capabilities, while requiring nominal U.S. government resources. This flagship partnership will also indicate to the rest of the world that the U.S. government is willing to engage its most distinguished citizens to advance the "New Beginning."



Thanks for our conversation the other day – below are a few follow-up thoughts I wanted to offer as you head into the international donors conference, having been in touch with a number of our Massachusetts doctors on the ground in Haiti as well as NGO's and the policy community.

My take - as we move forward past the recovery phase into reconstruction and renewal efforts – is that there are a few key issues we have to tackle at the outset.

First, we need to support the Haitians themselves, to the extent there is any fully formed civil society infrastructure in place Everything I hear tells me the Haitian people and the GOH are not exercising a strong enough voice in dictating their development priorities. That silence, whether true or perceived, is damaging to the overall rebuilding effort. In the UN Recovery Cluster, for example, there has been a need for and a push for more GOH involvement in overseeing the relocation process. As you know, if this process is not viewed as Haitian owned and Haitian led, it will damage the legitimacy of the rebuilding effort and undercut the credibility of the government to restore services.

Second, expectations There has been a lot of discussion about the need to "decentralize" Haiti and spread development and the population outside of Port-au-Prince to alternate cities. Yes, the current burden on Port-au-Prince is unsustainable and exacerbated the humanitarian devastation of the earthquake, but we also have to be realistic about what can be achieved. A massive permanent relocation of people away from Port-au-Prince will be time-consuming and extremely costly. Jobs will need to be created to provide livelihoods. Packages and incentives will need to be encouraged. Decentralization must be accepted and supported by the Haitian people – the best intentions to develop alternate economic centers will fall to waste if the Haitian people are unconvinced this is in their best interests, and given the concerns I have already about the GOH, we should carefully consider what is achievable.

Third, donors have to pick comparative advantages if this is going to work, and donors have to follow through on pledges and be held accountable when they don't. The PDNA pegs the level of need for initial reconstruction at \$11.5 billion. As of March 18, commitments to Haiti already totaled \$2.4 billion. Unfortunately, much of this funding historically has not been disbursed. For example, despite \$402 million pledged to support the Haitian government's Economic Recovery Program, when the country was trying to recover from a series of natural disasters, it is estimated that only \$61 million was actually disbursed. How we fund aid also needs to be revised. Disbursements

should go to NGOs only if they follow the new "rules of the road" which includes Haitian job creation, low overheads, strengthening of health and education systems and the public sector.

Fourth, significant assistance is required in the health sector. As you know, the PDNA estimates health infrastructure losses of \$1.4 billion. Currently, funding for social services has come largely from NGOs, with limited to no support directly to the public sector, resulting in an array of services that do not always follow national goals and are difficult for the MSPP to monitor, approve, or regulate. This is extremely problematic right now as doctors, nurses and other ancillary staff are not being paid by the GOH. The GOH is planning to reinstate fee-for-service on April 12, three months after the earthquake in order to be able to pay the public sector health staff. This will make health care costs prohibitive for most Haitians. Obviously the hope and bet right now is that a donor will emerge at the Conference on Wednesday but as you know this is not guaranteed.

There must be a system of funding the public sector and to adjust the mix of public and private funding in line with the economic needs of the health sector and the country. Financial sustainability and a functioning health system will help address the long term cycle of poverty and disease through positive contribution to overall economic development and performance. Good health is essential to development and for Haiti, recovery. Rehabilitation will be critical also. We need rehab hospitals and centers in the country to help with the massive number of injured and amputees. This is about not just regaining function, but also preventing stigma.

Fifth, as we talked about Monday – we've got to get kids in schools, and this does seem like a moment to grab that opportunity. Schools must be set up in the camps. Teachers will be needed and they need to be paid. Tents can easily serve as a site for the schools but need to be sturdy and protected form the rain. Nutrition programs should be established for children attending school also. These children represent Haiti's future. Professional schools have been destroyed in the earthquake. Of 25 medical students attending the medical school at the General Hospital, four survived. Those four have no classes to attend and no way to finish. This is true of many other medical and graduate students around the country – perhaps a mechanism could be devised where the United States and other French speaking countries can offer positions at their schools for these students to finish. There is a deeply delayed professional future for the country otherwise.

Sixth, creation of local jobs and building a local economy is a lynchpin for recovery. Cash for work programs have been instituted and will provide some immediate help, but this is not building for the long term. Local job creation is critical to incentivizing people to move out of PAP. Additionally, at the UN cluster meetings, there was considerable concern that there does not seem to be enough discussion, focus, and work on "Early Recovery for Institutions." For Haiti to have enough professionals for their future – and this needs to be near future – these institutions must be prioritized.

Seventh, there are about 640 camps and 1.2 million are people displaced to camps in PAP alone which is 1/3 of the PAP population overall. 650,000 have relocated outside PAP Many of these camps are cobbled-together cities of fabric and stick tents, corrugated iron, and strangers-come-neighbors. Relocation will be essential and 7 camps have been prioritized to move to new land. The GOH is working to identify possible land sites but this has proved extremely difficult. One major concern about the camps is no one knows at this stage how long people will have to live there Relocation to safe sites in PAP is going to be needed and preparation for the hurricanes and rains is essential. The camps are extremely vulnerable. Services will have to be established in these communities or around these communities

Finally, PAP and Haiti have suffered from extreme environmental degradation The pollution in PAP is a significant issue in terms of sanitation, safety, dignity and environmental preservation. The major canals are rife with trash, and now with the rains coming, contamination, disease and toxic waste will be a major issue. There is no enforcement of environmental regulations. The land is entirely deforested For example, a steel plant owned by the Acra family has been allegedly dumping toxic steel run-off down the hill behind it, where a camp is currently situated with 10-15,000 people living there. It, must be a priority that any programs, contractors, or developing industry be tightly regulated.



Secretary Clinton, below please find these brief updates on the electoral environment in Sudan based on conversations I had today with opposition parties, National Congress Party (NCP) leadership in the Government of Sudan, The Carter Center, and UN SRSG Haile Menkerios.

## Opposition Parties and the Ruling Party

In my update yesterday, I reported that most of the major opposition parties in Sudan withdrew their presidential candidates from the electoral race, but that the situation was fluid. At my first meeting this morning with Sadiq al-Mahdi, former Prime Minister of Sudan and presidential candidate from the UMMA National Party, I saw positions were already changing. Al-Mahdi said his party had shifted its position from an unconditional boycott/November postponement to a four-week delay, with their participation conditioned on enacting the following reforms:

- 1. Suspend aspects of the National Security Law during the electoral process
- 2. Ensure fair distribution of media and freedom of assembly
- 3. Activate the law allowing governmental financing of political parties running for election in order to enable to them to secure transport to polling places; and end misuse of GoS funds to support NCP electoral activities
- 4. Activate the law requiring National Electoral Commission (NEC) to place a ceiling on expenditures by parties for election activities

Among other things, UMMA is demanding a freeze of "repressive security measures," equitable access to state media, public funds for political parties and a commitment to Darfuri representation in the presidency.

The opposition also wants the elections postponed to the first week in May.

"These demands are shared by the other opposition parties with a few variations," Nugdalla said. "It is not too late to save" the elections.

Major opposition groups including UMMA -- winner of the last legislative elections in 1986, three years before President Omar al-Beshir came to power in a coup -- on Thursday announced a total boycott of the polls.

On Friday, UMMA chief Sadiq al-Mahdi met US envoy for Sudan Scott Gration, who is engaged in a round of talks aimed at saving the elections.

The opposition had so far demanded -- in vain -- that the elections be postponed until November, but Beshir and the electoral commission announced this week they would go ahead as planned on April 11.

"Gration has said he will try to get this delay" of four more weeks until polling day, Nugdalla added of talks between the UMMA chief and the American envoy.

Sudanese officials told AFP that Gration planned to meet electoral commission officials this weekend.

Secretary Clinton, below please find these brief updates on the electoral environment in Sudan based on conversations I had today with opposition parties, National Congress Party (NCP) leadership in the Government of Sudan, The Carter Center, and UN SRSG Haile Menkerios.

# Opposition Parties and the Ruling Party

In my update yesterday, I reported that most of the major opposition parties in Sudan withdrew their presidential candidates from the electoral race, but that the situation was fluid. At my first meeting this morning with Sadiq al-Mahdi, former Prime Minister of Sudan and presidential candidate from the UMMA National Party, I saw positions were already changing. Al-Mahdi said his party had shifted its position from an unconditional boycott/November postponement to a four-week delay, with their participation conditioned on enacting the following reforms:

- 1. Suspend aspects of the National Security Law during the electoral process
- 2. Ensure fair distribution of media and freedom of assembly
- 3. Activate the law allowing governmental financing of political parties running for election in order to enable to them to secure transport to polling places; and end misuse of GoS funds to support NCP electoral activities
- 4. Activate the law requiring National Electoral Commission (NEC) to place a ceiling on expenditures by parties for election activities
- 5. Stop the political linkage of the election and referenda
- 6. End the smear campaign against opposition parties
- 7. Make an accommodation for Darfuris, such as postponing the election until a peace agreement is negotiated
- 8. Create a State Council with political parties to iron out all conflict issues

Jake, Huma: After the President's April 12 meeting with Ukrainian President Yanukovych, the Secretary asked our Ambassador to Ukraine John Tefft about Hanna Herman, Yanukovych's press secretary, who was in the meeting (I have attached a few photos of Hanna above). The Secretary recalled that she had met Herman, but couldn't remember the details. John discretely inquired and, yes, the Secretary was right. Herman had met the Secretary in Poland some years ago when she was a Radio Liberty/Radio Free Europe correspondent based there. Hanna is a former member of Ukraine's parliament and a very engaging, outspoken personality. Fiercely loyal to Yanukovych, she's (paradoxically some might say) a liberal western Ukrainian not afraid to deliver news or advice that her boss doesn't want to hear. She's one of the folks responsible for Yanukovych's successful campaign image make-over. Let us know if you need more or there is any follow-up.

Hello Sung and Steve (from Beijing),

As I promised Sung, I would weigh in once I got back to Beijing. The visit to the DPRK by John Lewis, Bob Carlin and me was a shocker. They took us to Yongbyon and showed us a functioning 2,000 centrifuge uranium enrichment plant in operation and a small LWR under construction. The technical implications are significant and you understand the political implications better than I do.

I am attaching a quick-look summary of my technical observations. Bob Carlin will follow with policy observations based on our discussions with MFA officials and their implications as soon as he has a chance.

I am scheduled to be in DC for an advisory function for Secretary Steve Chu on Monday, Nov. 22. I will attempt to see Secretary Clinton since my colleague, Bill Perry, had mentioned my trip to her during a recent West Coast swing. And, of course, I very much would like to brief the two of you. At this point, I hope that Bob Carlin and I will be able to get appointments either late on Monday, Nov. 22 or early on Tuesday, Nov. 23.

We are all returning to San Francisco on Sunday. I will try to contact Sung from here and then again when I return to my Stanford office on Monday.

The Global Partnership Initiative had a productive week in pursuing your agenda to catalyze, coordinate and collaborate on new partnerships. This week:

Shanghai Expo:

- o I met with the Chinese Ambassador and Corporate Reps in DC to encourage participation in the Expo. GE hosted the event and encouraged all companies to participate. The pitches were wellreceived and attendees are pushing their respective businesses to participate
- o PepsiCo and Microsoft have committed \$5m and \$1m, respectively, to the Expo.
- o Total estimated contributions so far are approximately \$20M (see attached.)
- Italian Earthquake Response: On June 17, Deputy Secretary Lew met with the National Italian American Foundation (NIAF), members of NIAF's steering committee, and members of the DoS-NIAF partnership coordinating committee. Project plans for the partnership in response to the April 6 earthquake in L'Aquila, Italy, that might be highlighted at the July 8-10 G8 Summit include three deliverables with a visual component that will be underway in July and others that could be announced at that time.
- · My swearing-in ceremony brought together leaders from Congress, the Diplomatic Corps, the UN, Private Sector and Foundations. While you were sorely missed at the event, the Deputy Secretary delivered your remarks and noted that the State Department's doors are open to new ideas and voices and that we stand ready to catalyze, coordinate and collaborate on



## LJ TRANSITION MEMO

#### **APPLES**

I order apples for the Secretary's office from Keaney Produce (in Landover, Maryland). We have an account there. You can reference old receipts, but here is the information you need:

Phone number for ordering: 301-772-3333

Account number: 008056

Driver's cell phone number: (Be sure to ask for the driver's cell phone number before meeting the delivery person street-side. And bring your cell phone with you).

The payment for the apples is direct bill (Justin Cooper takes care of it). Be strategic when ordering. (Don't order a box of apples 10 days before the team goes on a huge trip – they will go bad). Keaney Produce will ask you if you want a large box or a small box; always pick the small one; there will always be more apples than you can use. Apples go in the blue bowl in her office, on the coffee table. Check them every day to be sure they are good, and refresh as needed. Be sure all stickers are removed, rinsed, and they should look "pretty," no brown spots or bruises. The "aesthetic misfits" can be put out in the 7<sup>th</sup> floor or 8<sup>th</sup> floor kitchen for the staff to enjoy.

The contact at Keaney Produce, if you ever have problems and need to speak with a supervisor, is Roy Carguiulo.

Should you decide to discontinue service with this company, <u>be sure to notify</u> <u>Justin Cooper</u>, since he gets direct-billed for the produce.

## ARTICLES E-MAILS FOR PRINTING

Must always be blown up to 14-pt font (minimum). For newspaper articles, HRC does not need the original newspaper copy returned to her (although it's a good idea to keep it for a few days before tossing it).

#### **BUSINESS CARDS**

If HRC passes out business cards for follow-up, be sure to send back into her a clean, typed synopsis of the outcome once you've completed the follow-up. Include a copy of the card to refresh her memory. All business cards should also be added to the database.

## CALL GRID

There are two portions of the call grid to be maintained. One is the "call grid." The other is the "call cover page." They always go together, although they are maintained as separate documents. They are located on the low side. I Drive: Docs: LJCC: Call Grids: <choose month>

Call grids are printed for the Secretary every day (at whatever time makes most sense). Sometimes it makes sense to print in the middle of the day (especially if there have been substantial changes since the day before). Other times it makes sense to print an hour or so before she leaves at the end of the night. When the Secretary is travelling, then call grids must be e-mailed to the travelling assistants. E-mail a copy to Huma and whichever other assistants (Claire, Lona or Monica) is travelling with her. The copy that you send to the travelling team should always be either a scan or a pdf; one simple document consisting of the cover sheet and the grid put together.

The call grid is maintained on a daily basis. The date and time at the top of the grid should be changed every single day. When the Secretary is travelling in another time zone, you should also reflect that time. The time listed should always be the time that you PRINT (or SEND) the call grid. It should look like this:

CALL LIST
Friday, October 7, 2011
1:30 PM EDT

Or this (when she is travelling):

#### CALL LIST Friday, October 7, 2011 4:00 PM EDT / 10:00 PM Rome

(Adjust the time/date information at the top of the grid also.) The call COVER sheet sometimes exceeds one page in length. When that happens, you should never use the second page. The completed call grid package that goes to the Secretary every day should consist of a ONE-PAGE call cover sheet stapled to the call grid. Use the entire call GRID, regardless of its length. The call cover sheet's purpose is simply to provide the Secretary an easily-readable snapshot of what's on deck. The grid is set up to reflect phone numbers.

Never remove a call from the grid unless the Secretary or Huma specifically asks you to, or it becomes OBE. Be sure to notify Huma and Claire whenever a call comes off the grid. Whenever you remove a call from the grid, be sure to reflect that in the "completed calls" document which is located in the LJCC folder. This document is updated from the top down; most recent changes go on top. Also, if the Secretary asks you directly to remove a call from the grid, then be sure to inform Huma and Claire by e-mail. This document, over the years, has been mostly for my personal reference. It tells me when, where, and why she spoke with someone. It also tells me why a call was removed from the grid, and when. Additionally, it is a good reference for obscure or hard-to-find phone numbers.

Official Foreign calls should be <u>maroon</u>. (Official calls only – overseas calls that are <u>not official</u> go in **black**.)

Hill calls should be blue.

Everything else (personal and miscellaneous) is black.

\*\*Put one current copy of the call cover sheet in the folders for Bernadette, Nima, Alice, Cheryl, and Jake at least <u>once a week</u>. This is because they do not ordinarily see the grid, and if they have current information pertaining to the status of a pending call, they can flag it for you to adjust accordingly.

#### CALLS

If you receive an incoming call for HRC, be sure to e-mail Claire and Huma with the person's name and subject matter. For calls from Members of Congress, also include Dave Adams and Joe Macmanus on H staff.

## REQUESTS FOR SIGNATURE

You will get many requests for the Secretary to autograph something. You will have to use your judgment, but there are a few hard-and-fast rules.

- 1.) **Books:** The Secretary should never autograph a book that is not one of her own (Living History, It Takes a Village, etc). She cannot autograph works by other authors. (The purpose for this is two-fold: First, it helps to make the number of autograph requests somewhat manageable. Second, it's unsafe for her to be adding her signature to any work that is not her own, for obvious reasons).
- 2.) **Headshots:** Generally, if she is asked to sign a headshot for someone she does not know or have a connection to, then we will simply autopen it. The volume of requests that she gets for signature is just so high that it must be managed very carefully. Some headshots can be autopenned only. Some need a more personal touch; in that case, we can ask the calligrapher (Jennifer Nicholson) to pre-inscribe the photo and then we add the auto-pen signature. You have to use your judgment, and don't be afraid to ask the team. Any member of the Armed Services (regardless of whether or not HRC has met them) should get a personal signature. Rob Russo can help you on judgment calls for this kind of thing.
- 3.) Other photos/posters/memorabilia: People ask her to sign all sorts of things. Run all of this by Huma for clearance on whether or not it's okay to have the Secretary sign. Claire, Monica, and Rob can help too.
- 4.) Never ever do we sign any **unauthorized biography**, under any circumstance.
- 5.) You will get lots of signature requests and they can sometimes be hard to keep track of, so I suggest you keep very careful, detailed records of who has asked for what. Makes life easier.

6.) Nothing goes in for signature without Huma first seeing it. Be sure to clear all autograph requests with her, always.

#### **CARDS**

Every morning, Claire will e-mail you which cards need to be made for the Secretary's meetings that day. Cards are made (usually) from the BCL for the meeting. The BCL's are usually found on the high side. The S-Specials can tell you where to find the BCLs for meetings. (They are organized by subject matter, region, and date). To make cards, follow these steps:

- Change the size of the classifications on both the header and the footer so that they are 8 pt. font.
- Change the paper size to 8 x 5
- Shrink the margins down to .2 on all sides
- Go to "header" > "edit header" and scale back the margin for the header to
   .2 Repeat for footer.

For any cards that you are preparing for an OFF-CAMPUS meeting, always print at least 2 sets. Give one to Claire (for HRC) and give a spare to Huma/Monica/whomever is attending the meeting with S.

## E-MAIL SUBSCRIPTION

The Secretary subscribes to the Progress report daily e-mail list. You should subscribe to this e-mail list. It usually comes to your in-box late-afternoon. (Sometimes after the secretary has left for the evening). It gets printed for her every day, and goes into a read file.

## LIBRARY

<u>Joan Sherer</u> from the Library will frequently e-mail updates with overdue library books. When those updates come in, e-mail Monica and Huma to see if the books

can be located. In rare circumstances, when the books cannot be located, then they will have to be replaced. Monica can help with that.

To request a book on the Secretary's behalf from the Library, send an email to the "Library" collective in the GAL. Be sure that they know that the request is on the Secretary's behalf, so that they will procure the book if it isn't already in stock. Also, when you pick it up, be sure that the book is checked out on the Secretary's account (under her own name), rather than your own. (This mistake is frequently made). The easiest way to keep track of what is outstanding is to have all books issued under her account.

If the Library has a copy of a book that the Secretary has requested, but it is currently issued to another Library patron, the Secretary is usually fine to wait for it to be returned. I always ask her to be sure. Sometimes the Library staff will volunteer to recall the book from a patron for her — please be sure to discourage them from doing this. If she needs a book in short order and it is currently checked out to another Library patron, then they have the ability to procure a second copy for her use.

## **LUNCH MENUS**

Every day, Monica will forward the lunch menu from the kitchen. Sometimes it comes in early, with a good deal of advance notice. Sometimes we don't get it until closer to the lunch hour. Whenever it comes in, print as soon as possible. Claire will put it on the Secretary's desk.

## MINI SCHEDULE

Every morning, HRC gets a "mini schedule" e-mailed to her. To create the mini schedule:

Take Lona's schedule. Open it up and strip of any headers and footers, and any extraneous information. Just times, name of event, location. To see examples of old minis, go to "LJCC" folder and then "mini schedules" folder.

In the morning, e-mail the mini schedule to HRC and cc: Huma & Lona. The subject line should read like this:

"Mini Schedule, Friday, October 7th 2011"

At the end of the schedule, type "##" to indicate the end. Do not put a signature at the bottom of this e-mail. It should contain the mini schedule only.

#### **MOTORPOOL**

To set up a motorpool request, the process has gone all electronic, and therefore has become somewhat laborious. An account must be created at:

#### http://ilms.irm.state.gov

Once you've created an account, there is no log-in process. The system will recognize your log-in from your initial computer log-ins. (Therefore, it's not possible to share an account name/password).

Once a motorpool request has been submitted, you will receive an e-mail confirmation.

If the vehicle is to travel with the Secretary's motorcade, it is VERY IMPORTANT to notify Diplomatic Security. They will need for it to be pre-positioned by the cage no later than one hour before the scheduled departure time. They will also need made/model/tag #, and driver's name. Additionally, these specific instructions need to be made to motorpool when you submit the electronic request.

#### **PLANTS**

Whenever Claire is travelling or away, be sure to give all of the plants in the office some water (including those in Huma's and Alice's offices).

#### PUBLISHING REQUESTS

We have a "blanket no" policy on all publishing requests. The Secretary is not permitted to do them for ethical reasons. I respond to all publishing requests on a case-by-case basis. Publishing requests include:

- Requests for a book "blurb"
- Requests for contributions to the content of a book or any item for publication.
- Requests for any comment, verbal or written, about <u>any</u> work or publication.

Some sample language for a publishing regret:

Dear Mr Smith,

I recently received your letter and request for Secretary Clinton to collaborate on your upcoming work, *Living Voices*. Regrettably, under the advisement of the ethics attorneys at the Department of State, she is unable to contribute to works intended for private publication, no matter how worthwhile the subject matter may be. Therefore, she will not be able to contribute to this project.

I know that Secretary Clinton would want me to extend to you, and to Westminster, her best wishes for every success in this endeavor.

Regards, xxx

#### **VIDEOS**

All scripts must be proofed and edited for style. Always double-check phonetics. Phonetics that the building sends up are not always accurate OR logical. In my experience, phonetics need to be corrected more than 50% of the time.

A mixed picture has emerged in advance of Burma's April 1 by-elections, with greater inclusiveness and openness on the one hand and credible allegations of election manipulation on the other. At stake are 48 vacant parliamentary seats – less than eight percent of all seats in Burma's Union Parliament. Aung San Suu Kyi (ASSK) and the National League for Democracy (NLD) are contesting 47 of 48 seats, with ASSK a candidate in Kawhmu constituency just outside Rangoon.

on venues for opposition political rallies and censorship of political speeches. We've also heard reports of intimidation by officials from the ruling party including telling villagers if they voted for opposition parties, "we will wipe you out." While there are plenty of credible allegations, the irregularities appear more a result of traditional hard-ball politicking and locally entrenched interests rather than a central-government directed effort to skew the outcome.

The current campaign is significantly more free and fair than the highly stage-managed 2010 election in which coercion and vote-buying were widespread, according to opposition parties and local NGO contacts. Similar to 1990, ASSK traveled throughout the country to campaign for the NLD, drawing crowds up to an estimated 100,000 persons. With relaxed media restrictions, ASSK is featured widely in the press and broadcasted speeches via state media, though authorities did censor some of her comments. In response to complaints about the voter registration lists, the Union Election Commission allowed the NLD additional time

to vet the lists. Burma's invitation to host international observers, albeit late and not up to international standards, nonetheless is a first step forward.

The Government of Burma invited ASEAN as an institution, ASEAN states, ASEAN dialogue partners including the United States, and the UN to send a select number of representatives and journalists to observe the by-elections. The Burmese government has not accepted full international observer missions or professional NGO election monitors but a number of international and domestic NGOs are inside Burma preparing for informal observation of by-election activity. The Burmese government also invited resident diplomatic missions to observe the elections, as it did in November 2010, but this year sent invitations two weeks in advance as opposed to 48 hours before election day. Embassy contacts report that observers will have access to a constituency of their choosing and be allowed to enter polling stations. It remains unclear if any observers will be allowed to view the vote counting process.

The seats at stake in Burma's by-elections are a fraction of the country's fledgling parliament. Nevertheless, ASSK and NLD's participation have dramatically increased the significance and symbolism of April 1 – now a major milestone if not a referendum on Burmese democracy. We are monitoring the process closely. On April 1, we will send a diplomatic observation mission, two representatives as part of the international observation team, and deploy other embassy staff in key constituencies as part of our own independent effort. We also have a strong network of local contacts in place and will consult closely with ASSK and other stakeholders following the election to assess the credibility of the process.



World Bank: Meles called on African countries to stand behind the candidacy of highly respected Nigerian Finance Minister Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala (a former Bank Managing Director) in his keynote address to a conference of AU economic leaders on March 26. The AU Commission subsequently issued a communiqué backing Ngozi's candidacy. However, one of Nigerian President Jonathan's advisors has reached out to assure us that the nomination was not an affront to U.S. primacy at the World Bank, and Nigeria did not expect her nomination to prevail. The Dominican Republic nominated former Colombian Finance Minister Jose Antonio Ocampo, who might have difficulty gaining support since a Colombian already heads the Inter-American Development Bank. With the announcement of President Obama's nomination, Jeffrey Sachs announced that he had withdrawn his candidacy and supports Kim. World Bank engagement in Ethiopia currently consists of 24 projects spanning infrastructure, poverty reduction, agriculture, and health. The Bank has invested \$9.1 billion in Ethiopia since it joined in 1945.

Somalia: During your meeting in February, PM Meles requested U.S. support for Ethiopian activities in Somalia. Since then, Meles, the Foreign Minister and the Chief of the Defense Forces have all raised the request with our Ambassador on several occasions, because the cost of operations is draining Ethiopian resources. # PRESIDENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF MALAWI

The Right Honourable Joyce Banda assumed the presidency of Malawi upon the death of President Bingu wu Mutharika on

April 5, 2012. Her stated mission in life is "to assist women and girls gain social and political empowerment through entrepreneurship and education." She began her work in civil society working with grassroots women. In 1989, she founded the National Association of Business Women (NABW), now serving over 50,000 women with economic empowerment activities, and later co-founded the African Federation of Women Entrepreneurs (AFWE) in Ghana. In 1994, she was the first woman to chair a Statutory Corporation, the Malawi Housing Corporation, and later on also served as the first woman to Chair the board of another key statutory corporation, the Agricultural Development and Marketing Corporation (ADMARC). In 1996, she served on the International NGO Advisory Committee to UNFPA, and along with 13 African Women Leaders founded the Council for Economic Empowerment of Women in Africa (CEEWA).

In 1997, she achieved global recognition, by receiving the Hunger Project Africa Prize for Leadership for the Sustainable End to Hunger, which she shared with the then President of Mozambique, Joaquimo Chissano. To date she has received fourteen International Awards for her contributions to uplifting lives of disadvantaged groups and has been voted Woman of the Year in Malawi in both 1997 and 1998.

In 2000, Banda was elected First Chairperson of the NGO Gender Network. Gender Network has been an instrumental civil society network championing women's rights in the country. It currently has a membership of over thirty local NGOs. In the same year she co-founded the Young Women Leadership Network, and launched the first Malawian Women Leaders Directory, a tool for networking between senior and emerging leaders, and a platform for making visible Malawian women leaders.

Banda recognized that there were some persistent structural barriers limiting women's empowerment, including the absence of laws that protect women. This prompted her to successfully seek election to Parliament in 2004 for Zomba Malosa Constituency. In his first cabinet, President Dr. Bingu wa Mutharika appointed her as Minister of Gender, Child Welfare and Community Services, where she spearheaded a number of activities to empower women and the

vulnerable groups, and notably championed the passing of the Prevention of Domestic Violence Bill in April 2006. From 2006 to 2009 she served as Malawi's Minister for Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation.

Banda was next nominated by the President as his running mate, and in the May 2009 elections, she achieved another 'first' by becoming Malawi's first female Vice President. In the past year, she served as the African Union Goodwill Ambassador for safe motherhood for Malawi, and this appointment enabled her to fulfill one of her long standing areas of passion – maternal health. In May 2010, she was nominated by Mary Robinson, Former President of Ireland, to become a member of the Global Leaders Council for Reproductive Health. She is currently serving on this Council alongside other notable global leaders and uses this platform for global advocacy to make lives better for women, especially on issues of maternal and reproductive health.

Joyce Banda was born in 1950. She is a Church Elder of Central African Presbyterian Church and a member of the Women's Guild. She is married to Retired Chief Justice Richard Banda.
